Yelena Yemchuk: Gidropark

Yelena Yemchuk was born in Ukraine in 1970, when it was part of the Soviet Union. She immigrated to the U.S. with her parents when she was 11, became a successful fashion and portrait photographer here, and returned to Ukraine in the summers of 2005 through 2008 to shoot Gidropark.

Gidropark, which Ms. Yemchuk likens to a "Soviet version of Coney Island," was built in 1968 on the River Dnieper as a recreational complex. As a child, she spent summers there. Like so much else left in the collapse of the Soviet empire, it is shabby, and the people inhabiting it--children, teenagers, adults-seem somehow vacant.

Ms. Yemchuk demonstrates a sure sense of composition in these black-and- white images. The young boy standing in the water in "Gidropark (#55)" (2005) is simply framed so we can see the troubled expression on his face. The two teenagers in the photo "Gidropark (#45)" (2008), she with rings on three fingers of her left hand and a cigarette in her right, he with his left arm tentatively resting on her shoulders, look like the subjects in Bruce Davidson's famous 1959 "Brooklyn Gang." A young girl in a bikini doing a ballet split on the grass is ignored by the people in the background of "Gidropark (#22)" (2007). "Gidropark (#54)" (2007) is a wide-angle shot from overhead showing the texture of the ripples on the river and three diminutive figures isolated from one another in the water.
