Dear Sir:

It is my understanding that you represent a baseball club and it may be the Brooklyn Brown Dodgers or it may be a colored team under some other name, but it makes no difference to me what club it is. I wish to make and I do hereby make you my agent to contract for me and in my behalf with any club you may select for the season of 1946. And, I agree to sign a contract with such club as designated by you if and when such contract is presented to me, -- on the following terms and conditions:

- (1) Such contract, when offered, is to call for \$350.00 per month salary.
- (2) I am to receive \$1000.00 as a bonus for this agreement and the signing of the contract to be paid as follows:
 - (a) \$500.00 cash and at the time I sign this agreement with you my signature will be an acknowledgment that I have received the sum of \$500.00 from you in cash.
 - (b) A further and additional sum of \$500.00 is to be due and payable to me by you or at your direction on April 1, 1946.

What I am trying to do is to make an offer to you of my time and services as a baseball player with any club you may designate in consideration of the foregoing terms and conditions.

It is my understanding that my services as a baseball player are extraordinary and unique and that there is no adequate remedy at law for a breach of this contract by me; in the event of such breach you shall be entitled to equitable relief by way of injunction or otherwise.
